2017: Our year in review





2017 was an amazing year for Plumtree. We supported 636 families, held 28 workshops on preparing for the NDIS, and received industry accolades for our innovative programs including Now & Next.

Plumtree is your bridge to the NDIS

With the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) rolling out across NSW, there's a lot of concern about how current supports will be affected and the changes to come. Plumtree has the resources and experience to guide you, step by step, for a smooth transition to the NDIS.

> In 2016-17 before our transition, we held a range of workshops to inform families about the scheme and how to prepare for the changes.

Understanding the NDIS

The introductory workshop NDIS: The Basics explained the individualised funding model on which the scheme is based, discussed eligibility and the importance of focusing on outcomes for children and families. The workshop was also provided in Vietnamese, Arabic and Mandarin.

"Understanding that the NDIS is focused on outcomes was the biggest message I took away from this workshop."

NDIS First Plan Ready

6 Steps to NDIS: First Plan Ready is a practical workshop that helped parents gather relevant information about their child and family to present at their NDIS planning meeting. Families used an e-book developed by Plumtree to complete the six steps to being First Plan ready. The workshop was also provided in Vietnamese and Mandarin. Staff held one-on-one e-book sessions with families who couldn't attend the workshop.

Implementing plans

In-depth workshops focused on self-managing a plan using individual funding, plan management, and recruiting staff through an online platform that links families with the right disability support worker.

A representative from the National Disability Insurance Agency delivered an advanced workshop to families on planning.

"I was so worried about my first planning meeting with the NDIS, but feeling in control now that I have been through the 6 Steps workshop. Writing everything down and talking to other parents has been really practical."



NDIS for Aboriginal families

In partnership with First People's Network, two NDIS information sessions were held for Aboriginal families. Highlights were a quest speaker whose daughter is an NDIS participant, and the resources shared to help Aboriginal families understand the NDIS.

Family-centred practice

We know that each family is unique, and parents know their child's needs and abilities best. Plumtree works in partnership with families to provide the right supports and positive outcomes. Family-centred practice is the gold standard in early childhood intervention services.

Planning plays a part

Once you have an NDIS plan you can start to break this down into achievable steps. You decide the goals that reflect your family's concerns and priorities. Plumtree has also developed Pictability, a new approach that helps families set a positive vision for their child and family. Visually based, it identifies new possibilities through a fun, creative experience.

Now & Next

A Plumtree innovation has attracted industry acclaim, interest from local and overseas organisations, and received major government funding for expansion.



Plumtree is passionate about finding new ways to improve the lives of children and families.

Beginning as one-on-one sessions with parents, our Now & Next program launched as a group format last year to help families achieve positive outcomes through a peer leadership approach. A first of its kind in Australia and developed in-house, the evidencebased program won the 2017 ECIA NSW/ **ACT Excellence Award** and was a finalist in the **NSW Disability Industry Innovation Awards.**

Families taking the lead

Over eight weekly sessions run by parent peer facilitators, families learn about setting and achieving goals. Now & Next also provides valuable opportunities for families to connect, inform, support and motivate each other to see new opportunities for their child now and in the future.

Participants have been inspired and transformed by the experience.

"The program has been invaluable," says a mother. "I have renewed energy in helping Leon and gained skills to help him achieve his goals. We as a group have achieved and learnt so much from each other."

"I came along to the program thinking about what funding we could get from government agencies and who could fix my child. What I soon understood was that there is a lot that we can do as a family and that can really make a difference."

Now & Next alumni continue to connect, encourage and help each other through private social media and meetings. A major outcome of their first conference was the development of the Parent-Professional Relationships Statement, which was lauded as "a powerful and inspiring statement" by the Centre for Welfare Reform.

Peer networks have long been perceived by the disability sector as the way of the future, yet they have been a challenge to realise sustainably. We are proud to incubate peer networks in families of very young children with disabilities through Now & Next.

Originally developed with funding from NSW Ageing Disability and Home Care, Plumtree has since received additional funding from ADHC, FaCS and the NDIA to expand Now & Next throughout NSW. We look forward to helping more families flourish.



peer facilitators

When a father suggested during the pilot program that parents should deliver Now & Next, it got us thinking. We embraced this opportunity to meet the needs of families using the particular insights that they offer each other.

Plumtree has trained and employed 10 Now & Next Alumni as peer facilitators, who do a range of paid work including running groups, workshops, project management, and helping families with vison-setting and planning.

"The Now & Next program was energising, it gave me frameworks to follow and be guided by," says Melo Kalemkeridis. Becoming a peer facilitator has reignited his desire to help people. Having a lived experience shared with families attending the program enables a deeper connection and helps establish rapport, he says. "Often it feels like we're having a conversation, not training."

Stacey Touma found Now & Next life-changing. "I became a more confident and empowered parent." Becoming a peer facilitator enabled her to re-join the workforce in a field she's passionate about. "Plumtree provides great flexibility and understands that our family comes first, so I've been able to manage work and look after three children."

"I love being able to meet families and support them. A critical part of the program is helping families to see how important their role as a parent is – they can do so much for their child."

The interactive sessions enable parents to share their stories, learn from each other and build a network of support.
